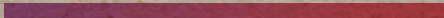


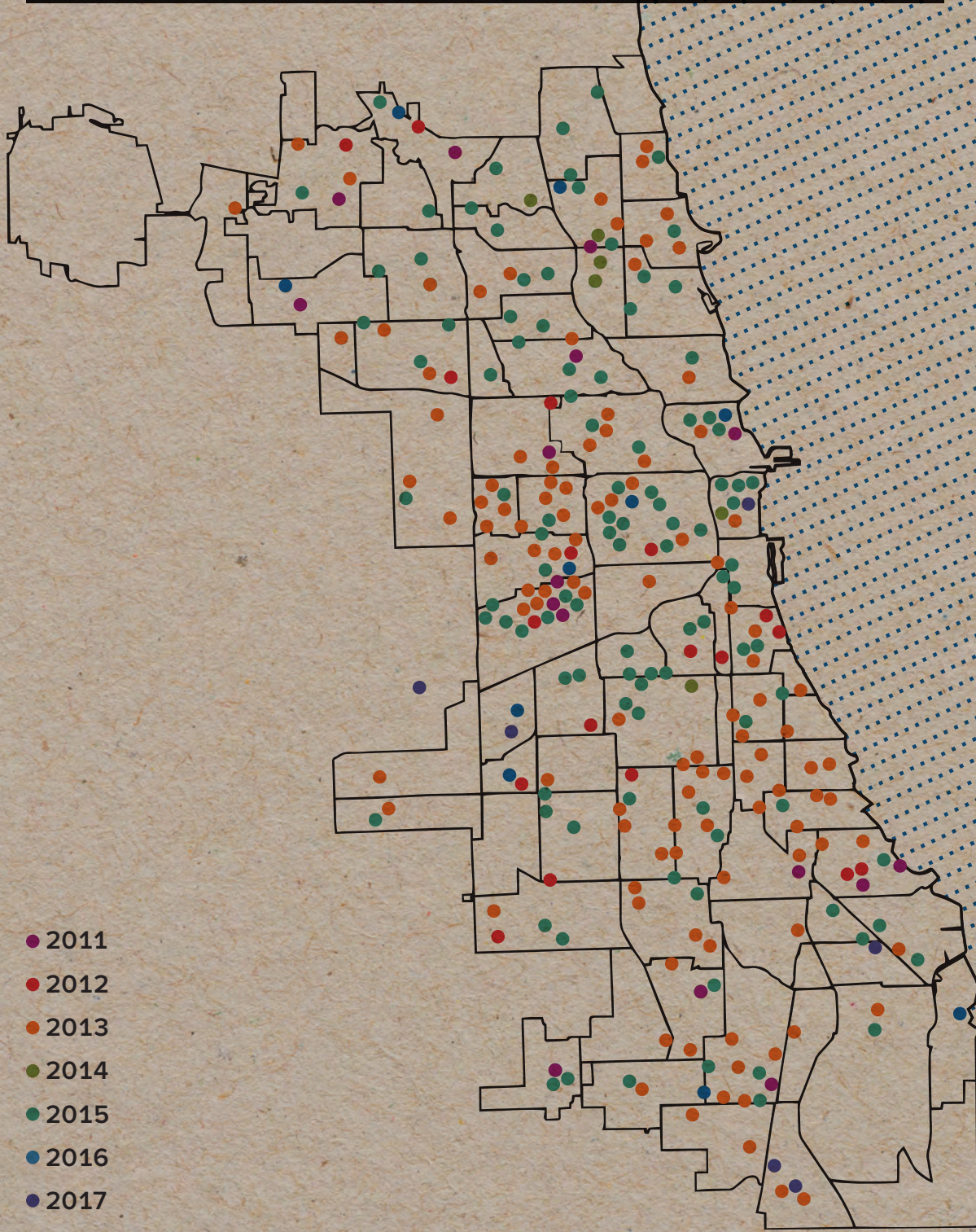

a letter from our chairman

In 2017, the Public Building Commission of Chicago (PBC) continued our excellent track record of providing contracting opportunities to minority- and women-owned business enterprises on a wide range of diverse projects. From innovative modernization solutions in schools to improvements in public libraries, the PBC's work in 2017 has helped to stabilize neighborhoods and serve as a catalyst for further community development.

These projects are inclusive of a culmination of a multiple-year modernization plan on behalf of Chicago Public Schools with renovations at Edwards Elementary and the decommissioning of the vacant Anthony Wing at Chicago Vocational Career Academy.

On behalf of the Chicago Public Library (CPL), the PBC completed the renovation of the Thomas Hughes Children's Library at the Harold Washington Library Center. The PBC also began construction on the Whitney M. Young, Jr. Branch Library Addition and Renovation Project. Both projects total **\$9M** in investments to support CPL and the City of Chicago's joint goal of providing access to quality library facilities throughout the city.

The PBC and City Colleges of Chicago began construction on the Daley College Engineering & Advanced Manufacturing Center. This **\$45M** project will provide City College students with access to state-of-the-art equipment for experiential learning and serve as a quality-control testing site for small to mid-sized local manufacturers.

The PBC formed an exciting partnership with the Chicago Park District with work beginning on the "Save Chicago's Treasures" initiative, a nearly **\$30M** program to improve aging Park District facilities over the next three years. Planning and design is underway and construction is scheduled to begin in 2018.

& executive director

On behalf of the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District, the PBC completed a **\$4.6M** energy retrofit project at the Calumet and Stickney Water Reclamation Plants as well as boiler replacement at the 125th Street pumping Station in West Pullman.

2017 also saw our continued partnership with the City of Chicago's Office of Emergency Management and Communications, as the PBC completed **\$13.5M** of enhanced electronic security measures, including the installation of cameras at various public locations across the city.

The culmination of these projects provided more opportunities to construction and professional service companies as they expand their horizons through the myriad aspects of creating these new spaces. We highlighted a select few project partners in this publication but are thankful for the hard work and commitment from all of our partners.

As the PBC continues to forge ahead, we are happy to reconnect with long-standing clients and hope that this 2017 Year in Review will illustrate how all the projects we completed this year honor our commitment to provide great public buildings and spaces that foster sustainability within our communities.

The experience and insight of the PBC's Board of Commissioners further our vision of developing public projects that strengthen our neighborhoods.

The Public Building Commission of Chicago is an independent agency formed in 1956 to oversee the construction and renovation of municipal buildings, facilities and infrastructure. The PBC can manage every aspect of project development, from land acquisition through planning, design and construction.

Mayor Rahm Emanuel serves as Chairman of the Board of Commissioners. Of the ten commissioners, one each is appointed by the Chicago Board of Education, the Chicago Park District, the Cook County Board of Commissioners, the Forest Preserves of Cook County and the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago.

The Chairman, with the advice and consent of the City Council, appoints the remaining five members who represent labor, commerce, clergy and the community. Board members are appointed for a five-year term or until a successor is named.

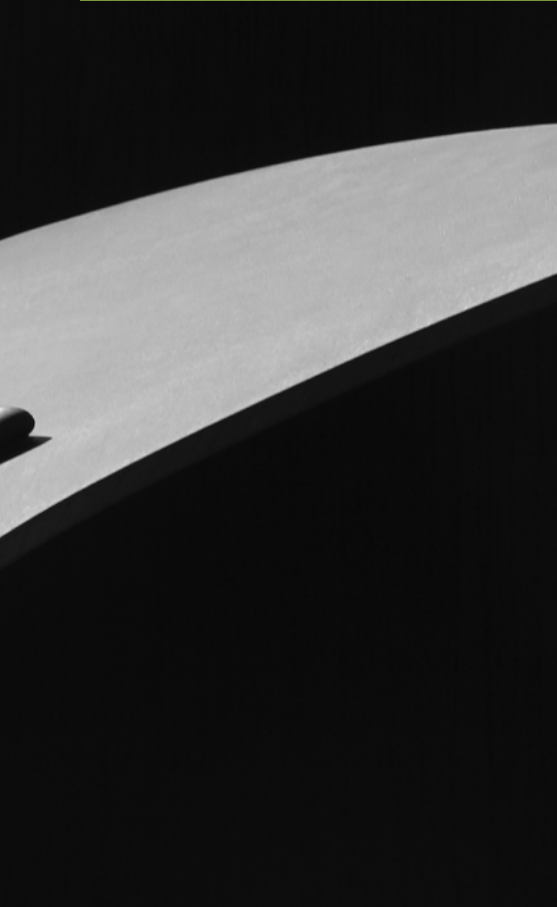

connecting to our past

The Picasso sculpture's
50 year celebration
ushered in the expanded
use of Daley Plaza.





In 2017, Chicago's iconic Picasso sculpture, located in the Daley Plaza, turned fifty. During a commemorative event in August, led by Mayor Rahm Emanuel, the 1967 unveiling was re-enacted with the daughter of poet Gwendolyn Brooks delivering the poem her mother composed for the occasion.

Over the years the appreciation for the sculpture has grown. Although people still debate what the piece resembles, it has become a popular meeting place. It's as much of a symbol of Chicago as anything else.

Therefore it is fitting that fifty years after Pablo Picasso's sculpture was unveiled, the city's sprawling Daley Plaza is ushering in another big change—renting out the space for private events.

The Plaza, which has acted as one of the city's defacto town squares for decades, can now be rented for private events such as weddings, festivals and corporate events.

connecting with the community

The PBC continues to provide opportunities to local businesses and create jobs for Chicago residents.





The PBC marked the successful completion of a number of projects that have brought new resources, jobs and opportunities to our communities. In 2017, the PBC:

- Created a quarterly external newsletter – *Constructive News You Can Use*. The new publication is electronically distributed to our clients, elected officials and stakeholders, alerting them to PBC’s current activities and opportunities and highlighting construction or professional service organizations with whom we work.
- Redesigned our website from a user’s point of view, improving ease of use for general contractors and professional service organizations while maintaining all data management functions.
- Held more than 20 presubmission conferences and contractor workshops to offer information on what potential contractors should expect through PBC’s bidding, contracting and reporting process.
- Attended professional service and general contractor membership meetings, including but not limited to HACIA, Construction Management Association of America, and the Construction Owners Association of America, to deliver presentations on upcoming projects and reinforce PBC’s commitment to directly affecting capacity building with MBE/WBE firms.
- Reconnected with Assist Agencies through various outreach efforts.





connecting businesses to opportunities

In 2017, the PBC increased our efforts to offer contracting or professional service opportunities to Chicago area businesses.




In 2017, of the more than **\$40.2M** paid to date, our projects have achieved a combined MBE/WBE participation of **48.8%**. MBE participation was comprised of **41.5%** or approximately **\$16.6M**, and WBE participation was comprised of **7.3%** or approximately **\$2.9M**.

In addition to project-level professional services, the PBC also tracks compliance on program-wide professional administrative services. These professional services are not project-specific and include but are not limited to: financial services, information technology, insurance broker services, legal services, office management, payroll, staffing, and property management. At 2017 year's end, of the more than **\$8.9M** paid to date on professional administrative services contracts, a combined total of **55.5%** MBE/WBE participation was achieved. MBE participation was comprised of **45.5%** or approximately **\$4M**, and WBE participation was comprised of **10%** or **\$900K**.

In 2017, the PBC:

- Continued to identify ideal projects for smaller or MBE/WBE firms to serve as the prime contractor. For example, CCCJV, a Class 'C' contractor, serves as the prime for the site prep scope at the Mt. Greenwood Elementary project. This will be the first time the joint venture will perform as a prime with the PBC.

connecting people to jobs

The PBC continued our mission to create jobs for residents of the City of Chicago and for those who live in the communities where our projects are built.



The PBC establishes city residency and community area hiring requirements for each construction project. This means 50% of the total hours worked on a project must come from City of Chicago residents.

At the outset of a project, the PBC defines the community area, usually the neighborhood and immediate surrounding areas, where a percentage of the total hours worked on a project must be worked by residents of that community area.



Community workforce participation helped to ensure that residents of designated community areas surrounding PBC projects were provided opportunities to apply for employment. As part of our efforts to promote and sustain community hiring, the PBC conducted **21** hiring outreach events and worked closely with elected officials, stakeholders and community partners to raise awareness of our community hiring program.

1,037 people earned more than **\$10.4M** working on PBC projects completed in 2017.

Many of these people are residents of the community areas where the projects were built.

connecting clients to cost effective project development

As a public developer, the PBC maintains transparency in reporting how dollars are spent.



After discussing owner-provided project requirements, the PBC, in collaboration with the client, will choose the most effective project delivery method.

Throughout the life of the project, the PBC monitors and provides updates on budget and cost performance to managers, clients, commissioners, and other stakeholders.

The PBC's total multi-year program authority for capital construction completed and in development since 2011 exceeds **\$2.3B**.

These projects are trending under budget by **6.6%**, representing a variance of **\$153M** under the current budgets.

The four projects completed by the PBC in 2017 represent **\$26M** in investments across the city.

chicago public schools: chicago vocational career academy exterior lighting & anthony wing decommissioning

In 2014, the PBC began the renovation of the Chicago Vocational Career Academy, creating career-focused classrooms to prepare students for jobs in a variety of high-growth industries: Navistar diesel technology, horticulture, carpentry, culinary services, cosmetology and healthcare. This phase also included renovating STEM and CTE labs and workshops.

In 2017, the PBC completed phase two of the project: decommissioning the school's vacant Anthony Wing and installing barriers and security lighting at the perimeter entries and exits of the building.



project partner spotlight: robe construction, inc.

Robe Construction, Inc. is a general contracting firm that specializes in new construction and remodeling in both commercial and residential properties.

This is the second time that Robe has acted as the prime contractor on a PBC project. Robe responded to PBC's 2016 RFQ for Project-Specific Prequalifications of General Contractors and is eligible to bid as a Class C General contractor.

The PBC completed target renovations on the first and second floor of Edwards school, updating the legacy building to match the three-story, 50,000-square-foot annex built by the PBC in 2016. These renovations included a new roof, exterior repairs and upgrades to the mechanical, electrical and plumbing systems.

chicago public library: thomas hughes children's library renovation at harold washington library center

The redesigned Thomas Hughes Children's library at Harold Washington Library Center now boasts bright welcoming colors, seating nooks built into bookshelves, plush lounge seating blocks and an active play area with 3-D printers, green screen, exhibit areas, puppet shows and sing-alongs. This PBC project included the demolition and interior build-out of approximately 25,000 square feet of library space as well as technology upgrades. The project also featured the installation of a blend of new and existing furniture.

The new children's area is part of a master plan for CPL to help children grow from spectators to active participants in learning while creating myriad possibilities for imaginative growth.

metropolitan water reclamation district: 2016/2017 energy conservation project & 125th street pumping station

The PBC began planning, designing and constructing a large-scale energy retrofit program for MWRD. The scope includes reviewing possibilities of energy savings at six waste water treatment facilities throughout the City and Cook County. In 2017, the retrofit was completed at three locations – 125th Street Pumping Station and Calumet and Stickney Water Reclamation Plants.

At 125th Street Pumping Station, the existing boilers were beyond their expected service life and in need of replacement. The PBC replaced the old 100-HP steam boilers with new high-efficiency fire-tube steam boilers. The new boilers have been resized to better match the heating load of the building, with improved turn-down capability for more efficient low-load operation.

The retrofit projects at Calumet and Stickney included the replacement of 20,000 obsolete fixtures with LED lighting, steam blanket insulation installation, and HVAC and control upgrades.

The entire program covers more than five million square feet of space and is guaranteed to reduce annual utility consumption by **\$1.4M** or an estimated **18%** annually.

city of chicago: office of emergency management & communications

In 2017, the PBC served as the unifying agency for the design and installation of security camera systems for the City of Chicago, Cook County and our Sister Agencies.

The PBC worked with each client to ensure the camera systems are designed and installed within a standard, unified methodology so each system will communicate with the security camera networks of the OEMC and DHSEM.

2017 Highlights include:

- 98 new cameras installed in various public locations
- 324 cameras installed in Chicago Police Department lock-up areas
- 126 Chicago Police Department street cameras installed
- License Plate Recognition in 18 patrol cars
- More than 2,500 cameras received preventative maintenance

LEED certification

Due in large part to the PBC's commitment to green buildings, the City of Chicago leads the nation in municipally owned LEED-certified municipal buildings with 116 facilities, 83 of which were developed by the PBC.

At the close of 2017, PBC has achieved LEED certification on the following facilities:

- ▶ 42 public schools
- ▶ 15 branch libraries
- ▶ 8 park facilities
- ▶ 6 firehouses
- ▶ 4 police stations
- ▶ 8 other municipal buildings, including the Daley Center
