








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Public buildings such as libraries, field houses, schools, police and fire stations, are important touchpoints for the communities they serve. In many respects, they contribute to the quality of life for individuals and groups in the community, but equally as important these public facilities provide convenient and efficient services, a sense of identity, and define the visual character of the City.

Since 1956, the Public Building Commission of Chicago (PBC) has delivered public facilities that represent sound investments of tax dollars and meets the needs of the citizens who will use them.

Driven by high-quality, cost-effective design and construction services, in 2019, the PBC successfully constructed or renovated 17 public facilities ranging from school buildings that provide students with cutting-edge facilities to learn and succeed to a Manufacturing Technology and Engineering Center of the future. In addition, the PBC created strong durable structures to store valuable city resources and completed projects under the umbrella of the Chicago Park District's Save Chicago's Treasures initiative. While the scope of each project varied, each project aimed to enhance the quality of life of Chicago residents by providing



safe, inviting facilities that prioritize the needs of citizens.

We are pleased to report that from the 17 completed projects in 2019 over 6,000 people earned more than \$66M. In addition, Minority Business Enterprises and Women Business Enterprises earned more than \$251M on 2019 PBC projects.

We are equally proud to state that we successfully continue to improve on our various delivery methods and we have utilized our quarterly newsletter to keep more than 8,000 individuals and organizations informed about current activities and opportunities.

As the PBC marks the close of another successful year, we are pleased to know that we are moving in the right direction and will continue our track record of delivering valuable public amenities in a way that illustrates excellent stewardship of the public funds.

It is with great pride that we present our 2019 efforts in this Year in Review.

PBC BOARD OF

The **Public Building Commission** of Chicago is an independent agency formed in 1956 to oversee the construction and renovation of municipal buildings, facilities, and infrastructure. The PBC can manage every aspect of project development, from land acquisition through planning, design, and construction.

Mayor Lori E.Lightfoot serves as Chairman of the Board of Commissioners. Of the current Commissioners, one each is appointed by the Chicago Board of Education, the Chicago Park District, the Cook County Board of Commissioners, the Forest Preserve District of Cook County and the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago.

The Chairman, with the advice and consent of the City Council, appoints the remaining five members who represent labor, commerce, clergy and the community. Board members are appointed for a five-year term or until a successor is named.



COST PERFORMANCE AND EFFECTIVENESS

To effectively utilize scared tax dollars, the PBC must execute strategies that keep operation performing at high levels. In addition to implementing a new construction project management software (e-Builder) that supports collaboration and provide visibility for all stakeholders, the PBC continues to institute performance management techniques that maximizes output.

In addition, the PBC measures the financial effectiveness and efficiency of each project undertaken.

The 17 projects completed by the PBC in 2019 represent 8307 million in investment across the city. At year's end, the actual cost for these projects is trending on budget, including a limited number of scope changes and discovered conditions.



In 2019 the PBC:

- Created and distributed a quarterly external newsletter – Constructive News You Can Use. The publication is electronically distributed to clients, elected officials and stakeholders, alerting them to PBC's current and upcoming activities/opportunities.
- Participated in more than 20 pre-submission conferences and contractor workshops to offer in-depth information on what potential contractors should expect through the bidding, contracting and reporting process.
- Attended professional service and general contracting membership meetings, including but not limited to Hispanic American Construction Industry Association, National Association of Women in Construction, Construction Management Association of America and Construction Owners Association of America, to deliver presentations on upcoming projects and reinforce PBC's commitment to directly affecting capacity building with minority business enterprise and women business enterprise firms.

CAPACITY BUILDING

The PBC continues to provide favorable circumstances where small businesses, Minority Business Enterprise and Women Business Enterprise (MBE/WBE) and their leaders can gain valuable work experience that can make them more effective and sustainable.

Through business outreach events, networking sessions, assist agencies, etc., the PBC offers individuals the opportunity to learn about the submittal process and future PBC projects prior to prequalification and bid events. This effort provides general/prime contractors, subcontractors or joint venture partners an opportunity to meet while promoting business opportunities. In addition, it ensures that the talent pool for all those who complete the actual design and construction of PBC projects reflect the diversity in the contracting and professional service industry.

JOB CREATION

The PBC focuses on economic sustainability in project and program development. The PBC established city residency and community hiring requirements for each construction project. This means 50% of the total hours worked on a project must come from City of Chicago residents.

For the two 2019 design-build projects, the PBC assisted the teams in hosting eight outreach events working closely with elected officials, stakeholders and community partners to raise awareness of the community hiring sessions. The PBC also meets on a regular basis with assist agencies, sister agencies and community groups to explore opportunities for increasing participation on projects.

6,064 people have earned more than \$66,716,950 working on PBC projects completed in 2019.

MINORITY AND WOMEN **BUSINESS ENTERPRISE PARTICIPATION**

PBC contracts include goals and requirements intended to promote a diverse local workforce and business participation on projects. These provisions encourage competitive business opportunities for MBE/WBE in its delivery of construction and professional services while supporting the use of minority and female journeyworkers, apprentices and laborers.

Projects completed in 2019 total \$251,914,874 as paid to date. These projects have achieved 32.02% or \$80,675,433 MBE participation and 9.34% or \$23,531,740 WBE participation.











In addition to project-level professional services, the PBC also tracks compliance on program-wide professional administrative services. These professional services are not project-specific and include but not limited to financial services, information technology, insurance broker services, legal services, office management, payroll, staffing and property management.

At year's end, more than \$11,926,641 million paid to date on professional administrative services contract, a combined total of 48.10% MBE/ WBE participation was achieved in 2019. MBE participation was comprised of 35.43% or \$4,225,881 million and WBE participation was comprised of 12.67% or \$1,511,022.

SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

The PBC integrates many sustainable strategies into each project that we develop. These strategies help to reduce the amount of energy used, they conserve our water, they connect use with transportation alternatives, they provide great outdoors and public spaces and they utilize regional and recycled materials.

Due in large part to the PBC's commitment to green buildings, the City of Chicago is a national leader in **LEED**-certified municipal buildings with 88 of which were developed by the PBC. The volume of public buildings certified under **LEED** standards is a strong indication of the commitment to sustainable design embraced by the City of Chicago.

In 2019, the PBC remained true to our vision of developing projects that inspire and support the goals of those who live, work and visit Chicago.

Our projects helped to create jobs and have revitalized and reshaped our communities, benefitting all of us.

On behalf of our clients, the PBC is proud to present the work we completed in 2019.

In 2019, the PBC assisted the Chicago Park District (CPD) in its efforts to deliver meaningful resources and services that will carry Chicago's parks into the future. The PBC completed eight rehabilitation and renovation projects under the umbrella of the Chicago Park District's Save Chicago's Treasures initiative and constructed a new single story 10,000 square foot fieldhouse and community center at Williams Park, 2820 S. State Street. The completed projects were part of a \$30M facility improvement program approved by the PBC Board in January 2017.


